Patient Support Networks: Something for Everyone

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With the emphasis of American health care shifting toward patient rights and education, the resources available through patient support networks are a valuable supplement to physician services. Support networks are groups organized around specific conditions or disorders, their diagnosis, treatment, and prevention. As with other forms of patient education, support networks enable patients to become more in-

They are multiplying like Texas bluebonnets in spring: support networks for patients. In this period of transition for American health care in which the emphasis has shifted to patient rights and education, resources from patient support networks are a valuable supplement to the physician's services. As with other forms of patient education, support networks can help patients become more informed about their health and take a more active role in their health care.

For years I have collected telephone numbers of local and national support groups, writing them into my "little black book" alongside the telephone numbers of colleagues and favorite restaurants. Only recently did I assemble the patient support groups into one list for easier access. My initial list of 20 or so rapidly expanded as I began to seek out resources for a more complete list. Organizations emerged from many sources: medical journals, lay magazines (particularly those for women), newspaper columns devoted to support groups and meeting dates, and patients.

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formed about their disease and to play a more active role in their health care. Following a summary of patient-physician-support network relationships and the benefits thereof, a list of patient support resources is provided.

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What Is a Support Network?

A support network is a group of people devoted to promoting the proper diagnosis, treatment, and prevention of a specific condition, primarily through patient education and support. Additional emphasis is placed on nonmedicinal treatment, such as nutrition, physical fitness, and stress management. Usually formed and managed by people who have the disease or by the family members of people who have the disease, support networks provide varying services, including:

- Written information in the form of newsletters, brochures, and medical articles
- Updates on the latest in medical research with regard to disease diagnosis, management, and prevention
- A list of local support groups that provide a means to share knowledge, ideas, and emotional support with other patients.

Family physicians are particularly well suited to using support networks in patient care settings, since our specialty has its foundation in our ability to see patients not as disease entities but as persons with many dimensions and interpersonal relationships. In my experience, I refer, or "plug in," patients to support networks far more often than do the specialists whom my patients see. Many years ago, on arriving in a new city to practice medicine, I tried to locate the area Alzheimer's support group. After calling the offices of three neurologists, none of whom knew

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


Figure. Multidimensional relationship among support network, patient, and physician.

about such a group, I contacted a social worker at the Catholic hospital, who provided the information I was looking for. When I called the Alzheimer's disease group coordinator, she was surprised and very happy that a *physician* was actually interested in their work!

Characteristics of Support Networks

Aside from the common goals listed above, support networks are tremendously varied in their structure and organization. Many are large and well known, such as the American Cancer Society and the Alzheimer's Foundation. Others are "kitchen table" organizations: small in size but large in commitment and enthusiasm. When one calls a network on the telephone, the person who answers may be in a large office building or at home. In addition to varying in size, support networks also operate on a wide range of budgets. The impact this variation has on patients is that some networks provide educational material, such as newsletters and brochures, at no cost to the patient, while others charge a fee.

A Healthful Trio

As in any relationship, the association between physician, patient, and support network has many dimensions (Figure).

1. SUPPORT NETWORK → PATIENT

Support networks provide to patients a multitude of resources, broadly classified as educational and emotional support. Fliers, audio and videotapes, newsletters, medical articles, and lectures provide the patient and family with information that is not always available at the physician's office. In addition, support group members encourage discussion among people with a similar disease, reassuring patients that they are not alone or unique. Many people find it easier to divulge feelings and problems to people outside the emotion-laden setting of the family, and can learn from solutions others have found to similar difficulties.

2. PATIENT→SUPPORT NETWORK

Many patients or family members, in return, share their talents and knowledge by becoming part of the support network organization. Their involvement often helps them look beyond their own problems and reach out to others: helping other people becomes their own therapy.

3. SUPPORT NETWORK→PHYSICIAN

The physician who makes use of support networks will discover an extraordinary array of resources, often available at no cost. In addition to the benefit of having a patient who is more educated about his or her disease and more motivated to treat it appropriately, the physician can obtain a variety of patient handouts to use in the office. Physicians may choose to have their names or practices added to the mailing lists of certain support networks. Liaison between the physician and the support networks facilitates patient referrals to physicians who are interested in or have expertise in a particular disease or condition.

4. PHYSICIAN→SUPPORT NETWORK

The support networks I have contacted have been happy to find an ally for their "cause" in the medical community. Interested physicians are invited to attend support group meetings to share their expertise with the community. I often send articles from medical journals to local support networks to update them on news from the medical front and to communicate my continuing interest.

5. PATIENT \rightarrow Physician

A patient can share with his or her physician information learned through a support network with regard to the latest discoveries and theories about the disease. This enhances the "partnership" model of the patient-physician relationship and improves the medical care provided to that patient as well as to others with the same condition.

6. Physician \rightarrow Patient

When physicians refer patients to support networks, they are demonstrating their perception of patients not merely as diseases, but as persons for whom they want the best possible care and resources. Referral to a support network acts to strengthen the patient-physician relationship, which is so deeply valued by family physicians.

Caveat Medicus

- When referring a patient to a support group, I briefly explain what to expect. Some people think of support groups as consisting only of meetings in which group members share feelings and experiences, and therefore do not care to take part in them. To avoid this misperception, I inform the patient of the varied services that the support group may have to offer, such as newsletters, research updates, and lectures by health professionals. Since the needs and personality of each patient vary, the referring physician should recommend that patients investigate for themselves to see if a particular resource meets their needs.
- Unfortunately, some support groups encourage members to seek subspecialty care: eg, the person with diabetes should be managed by an endocrinologist, patients with osteoarthritis by a rheumatologist, members of asthma groups by a pulmonologist. While in the audience of an infertility support group meeting, I once heard the speaker tell the group that every infertile patient should be evaluated not by a

gynecologist, but by a gynecologist with a subspecialty in fertility, and *certainly* not by a "GP." The irony is that we family physicians are capable of managing most chronic illnesses, and with a sensitivity and comprehensiveness often not displayed by other specialists.

• Some so-called support groups or "helplines" are not actually nonprofit organizations, but promoters of products or services. This is especially true for weight loss and mental health groups. For-profit groups have been weeded out of the list of support services provided in the Appendix. This listing includes some of the many support networks in the United States. It is not an endorsement of any program, but rather a listing of resources for the physician to provide to patients. I hope readers will find that it helps them better serve their patients.

The doctor of the future will give no medicine, but will interest his patients in the care of the human frame, in diet, and in the cause and prevention of disease.
